The Ministers go to the Crib, which the Priest blesses. We respond Amen.

Gloria in Excelsis

The Choir sings the Angelic Hymn, a Song of God's Glory. During the Gloria, the Priest censes the Crib and the Babe is laid in the manger.

The Collect

After a period of silent prayer, the Priest says the set prayer for this night. During this, the Deacon lights all the candles in the Wreath, including, for the first time, the white Christmas candle.

Eternal God, who made this most holy night to shine with the brightness of your one true light: bring us, who have known the revelation of that light on earth, to see the radiance of your heavenly glory; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Reading: Hebrews 1:1-4

We sit to hear God's word in scripture.

A reading from the Letter to the Hebrews.

Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds.

He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs.

This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God. We stand during the Gospel acclamation.

Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia. Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia.

Today Christ is born: Today the Saviour has come: Today the angels sing on earth: Glory to God in the highest.

Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia.

The Lord be with you **and also with you**.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

Glory to you, O Lord.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Creed

After a period of reflection, we stand to affirm the faith of the Church.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate: he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.

We kneel or sit as the Priest leads the intercessions, using the response

The Peace

We stand.

This holy night the angels sang, 'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to all in whom he delights.'

The peace of the Lord be always with you **and also with you.**

We offer a sign of peace to those around us, greeting them with a nod or a handshake.

Preparation of the Table

We sing as gifts of bread and wine are brought to the Altar.

The Eucharistic Prayer

It is traditional to stand or kneel throughout the Eucharistic Prayer, but please do whatever helps you to pray.

The Lord be with you and also with you.

Lift up your hearts. **We lift them to the Lord.**

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

The Priest praises God for his mighty acts, and especially tonight because God took on our humanity in order to save us from sin.

The Choir then sings

The prayer continues and leads into the final praise, to which we respond
